Introduction to Recipe Management

The Recipe Management module within the Agile PLM Recipe & Material Workspace (RMW) solution provides integrated recipe authoring capabilities that help you to track the development process of a product. In RMW, recipes are integrated with the related Bill of Materials (BOM), Bill of Equipment (BOE), and Bill of Processes (BOP) to maintain a complete and reliable electronic record.

The primary benefits of using RMW for recipe management are:

- Re-usability of recipe objects - Once created, each recipe object can be reused in other recipes and experiments or work requests, across multiple sites.
- Recipe and experiment results captured in electronic format - Recipes, experiments, and bills need not be created manually (in paper format) for each recipe instance.
- Ability to import and export recipes in XML - Eliminates manual errors during tech transfers; the transfer can be completed in a fraction of the usual time.
- Greatly reduced effort in authoring - Easy-to-use graphical and text editors simplify and expedite the recipe authoring process.

About this Guide

This guide provides information on all the features and functionality of the RMW Material Management module. It also covers instructions on how to use the various menus and commands available on the RMW User Interface to create and manage material objects. The features that are visible to you on the interface are determined by the access privileges assigned to you by an administrator.

Recipes in RMW - An Overview

A Recipe contains the minimum set of information about the developmental requirements of a specific product. Recipes generally include instructions about gathering and combining raw material, the type of equipment to be used, and processes to be followed to create the target product.

In RMW, instructions in a recipe can have embedded variables (placeholders) for generic resource names - for resources such as equipment, material, or standards. This type of authoring ensures that the recipes can be reused as required, with the variables resolved to specific values for each use in a project or campaign.

Within the product development cycle for a target material, as a project or campaign gets underway, the recipe that defines the process of creating that product is attached to a process step. Generic recipes are converted to project-specific Control Recipes, and these are in turn used to create Work Requests. Work Requests can be completed in an experiment, or logged as a production batch record.

Recipes can be versioned based on feedback from the pilot plant or commercial operations.

Types of Recipes

Recipes are classified into the following types:

- **General Recipe:** A General Recipe is the basis for lower-level recipes and used at the company level. It specifies the raw materials, quantities (of raw material) required and processing information for making the product. It only communicates processing requirements to multiple manufacturing sites.
- **Site Recipe:** A Site Recipe is created directly and takes into consideration the specific conditions or constraints of a particular manufacturing site. The user can select multiple sites for a site recipe. It provides the level of detail necessary for site-level, long-term production scheduling.

Site recipes contain information tailored for a target location. These can be modified for local language, local measurements and availability of local raw materials and

include information about on-site processing, storage capacity, and constraints. From a general recipe, you can derive multiple site recipes, each covering a part of the general recipe that may be implemented at a specific site.

- **Master Recipe:** A master recipe is targeted to a processing area and is created directly. In this recipe creation, user can select only one recipe. Master recipes depend on equipment types or classes, such as a glass-lined reactor or mixing vessel. These recipes can contain product-specific information required for detailed scheduling, such as equipment requirements. But unlike the general and site recipes, S88 batch control requires a master recipe. A master recipe is the template for recipes used to create individual batches. Without this template, no specific batch recipes can be created, and therefore, no batches can be produced.
- **Control Recipe:** A control recipe is used to create a single, specific batch. It starts as a copy of a master/general/site recipe and is modified as necessary to create a batch. The modifications may account for batch size, characteristics of raw materials on-site (For example: potency), or actual equipment to be used. While several (dozens, hundreds, or thousands of) batches may use the same master recipe, every batch has a single control recipe unique to that batch and that batch alone.

Two control recipes may be identical in ingredients, quantities, or equipment used, but they are identified individually. Control recipes unique to individual batches allow product tracking or genealogy tracking to occur.

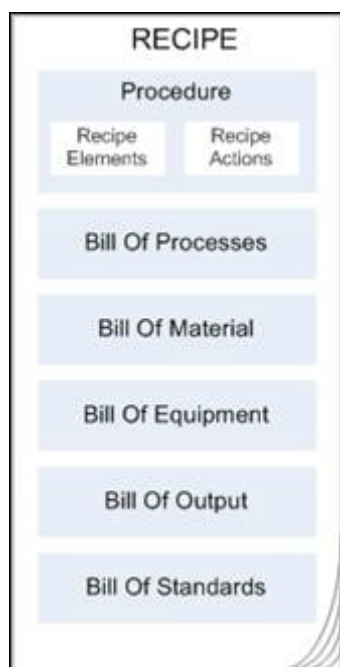

Recipe and Recipe Templates

The difference between a Recipe and a Recipe Template is that templates have unresolved variables and parameters, with undefined constraints. A Recipe needs to be complete and ready before you can execute it.

Recipe Components

A Recipe in RMW is a structured compilation of a set of components as shown below. The following sections describe each component.



Procedure

In RMW, a recipe procedure is a structural representation of Recipe Elements, Recipe Actions, and associated objects. The RMW user interface allows you to create Recipe Element Templates and Recipe Action Templates which can then be reused while authoring recipes.

Recipe Elements

A recipe element is a procedural element that is used to represent an entity in procedure function charts. A recipe element can be any of the following:

- **Unit Procedure** - an ordered set of operations carried out to completion on a single unit. It is a contiguous production sequence acting on a single unit only. Only one unit procedure is allowed to be active on a unit at a time. Multiple unit procedures can run concurrently as part of the same procedure, as long as they are active on different units. Unit procedures can contain operations, phases and actions.
- **Operation** - an ordered set of phases carried out to completion within a single unit. An operation usually takes the material being processed through some type of physical, chemical, or biological change. Like unit procedures, the standard presumes only one operation is active on a particular unit at a time. Operations can contain phases and actions.
- **Phase** - A phase is the smallest element of procedural control that can accomplish process-oriented tasks. A phase performs unique and generally independent, basic process-oriented functions, such as charging an ingredient or agitating a tank. All other elements (procedures, unit procedures, and operations) group, organize, and direct the phases.

Recipe Actions

A Recipe Action contains an instruction to perform a unique and generally independent action related to the manufacturing process. It allows the author to specify the following details:

- **Variables** - resources you can use. For example: Equipment, Material, and Standards
- **Parameters** - parameters you need to measure or control
- **Second Person Verification** - whether you require electronic signature and second person verification.
Electronic Signature indicates that an operator completed the task
Second Person Verification indicates that a second person or automation verified the action or measurement
- **Execution mode** - manual or automatic.

Bill Of Processes

A BOP for a target material contains a list of materials, equipment, process steps, standards, control parameters, and measured parameters which may use assays. BOP contains the process of sequential flow of elements and actions. At the heart of the creating a Work Request is a series of steps that go into creating the target material, called the Bill of Process (BOP).

BOP is composed of one or more recipe elements and/or recipe actions. Recipe elements contain recipe actions which is the lowest level of instruction.

Bill Of Material

A Bill of Material (BOM) is an assembled list of all materials and their quantities (with UOM's) required to produce a target/output material at a given site, including materials not related to production. For example, shipping materials, or other consumables required for the overall recipe.

Recipes contain text instructions embedded with variables which act as placeholders for defined material types or categories. Each variable is associated with certain criteria that qualify the material. When these recipes in the master library are "resolved" by the user, the software automatically generates the BOM for the Recipe.

While editing a Recipe Action instance in edit Recipe page user can add multiple Material directly.

Bill Of Equipment

A Bill of Equipment (BOE) is the approved list of equipment used in the process of creating a product. When the equipment-related variables in recipes are resolved by the user, the application generates the BOE for the Recipe.

While editing a action instance in edit recipe page, user can add Equipment directly.

Bill Of Assays

A Bill Of Assays (BOA) is a list of assays that are referenced indirectly from a Recipe. If recipe actions within a recipe contain parameters that have references to defined assays in the system, the application generates a BOA for the Recipe.

Bill Of Standards

A Bill of Standards (BOS) is a library of pre-defined statements relating to the safety and caution of a manufacturing process. It comprises of general instructions, guidelines and specifications you have to adhere to while handling equipment,

material and processes in the industry and organization. Standards are used while authoring Unit Operations and creating ControlRecipes, Process Steps and Work Requests.

Output

Quantities of materials or resources, created as a result of the product manufacturing processes define Output. The quantity specified for output material at Recipe creation level is the planned quantity. Actual quantity will be added only after the output material is added to inventory at Work Request level.

Authoring Recipes

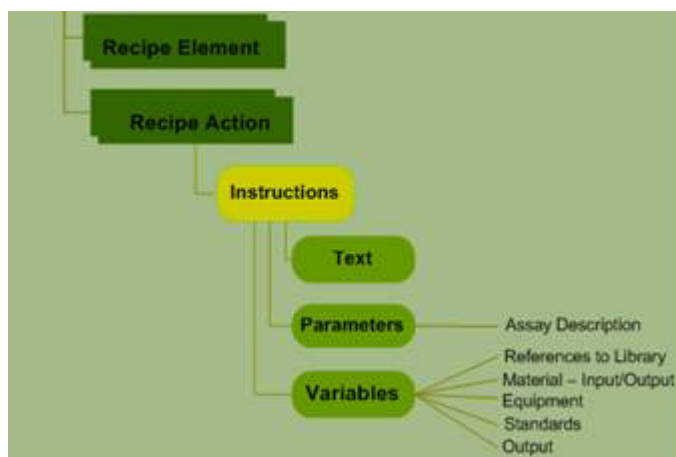
Recipe authoring involves creation of recipe actions and recipe elements - the essential components of a recipe. Instructions or the procedures for recipe execution are created in recipe action template. These instructions include:

- **Variables** - material, equipment and standards.
- **Control Parameters** - to set the control settings within the Recipe.
- **In-process parameters** - quality parameters you need to be measure during the process or the actual values that the operator used for the control parameters or measured parameters.
- **Results** - analytical result measurements for the sample taken from the material being made.

Since recipe actions are embedded in the elements of a recipe, the recipe author adjusts the recipe action template to suit the requirements of each recipe. Phases can also exist as templates and can be reused.

The sequential flow of recipe actions is created in recipe element template. This flow can include other recipe elements as well. You can further modify these components in the recipe and then later optionally save a recipe element as a template.

A **Recipe** is authored by creating a sequential flow of recipe elements and the recipe actions embedded within, and added externally, if required. The instructions defined in recipe actions become bill of processes. The resources associated with the variables form bills of material, equipment and cautions (standards). All tests associated with recipe elements form the bill of assays.



Creating Recipe Action Template

A **Recipe Action** template is a recipe object that defines the procedures to create a recipe. Since Recipe Actions are embedded in the elements of a recipe, the recipe author adjusts the Recipe Action template to suit the requirements of each given Recipe. Phase, Operation and Unit Procedures exist as templates and can be re-used in higher level elements/ recipe library. When the Phase or Recipe Action template objects are included in a Recipe, the contents are copied into the Recipe.

The author can further modify these components in the Recipe and later optionally save the element as a template.

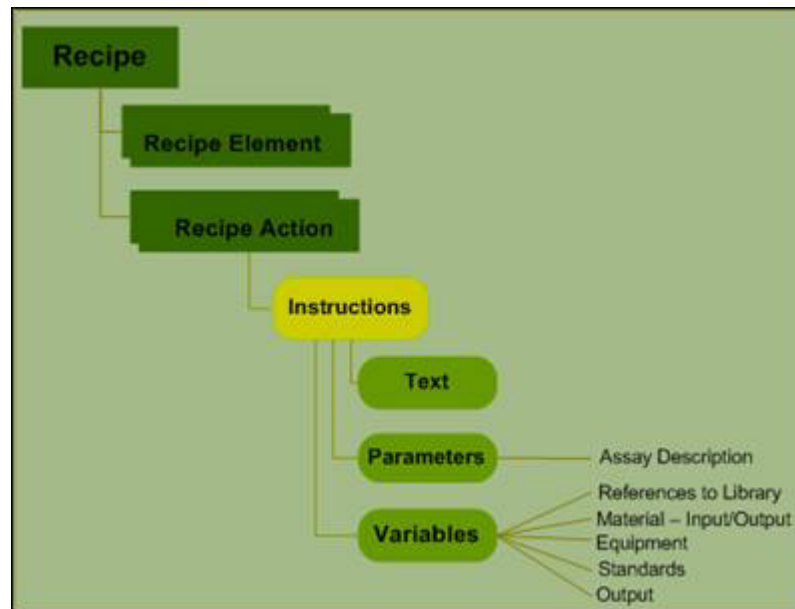
To create a recipe action template:

1. Go to Create New menu, select Recipes > Action Template.
2. In the General tab, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- **Mode** - Method of recording activities.
 - **Second Person Verification Required** - If you require another person to verify the recipe actions.
 - **Category** - The group of resources, such as material, to which this recipe action template belongs.
3. Click Next.
 4. In the Instructions tab, enter instructions in the Text Editor.
 5. Click Next.
 6. In the Characteristics sub-tab under the Details tab, enter the required information.
 7. Click Next.
 8. In the Acknowledgments sub-tab under the Details tab, enter the required information.

You can define acknowledgments to ensure that proper procedure is followed during recipe execution. This allows the recipe author to add an acknowledgment that will be required by the operator to acknowledge the instructions/statements while executing the current recipe action. You can also specify if this acknowledgment requires a second person verification or electronic signature.



Editing a Recipe Action Template

You can edit a Recipe ActionTemplate only when it is in the Draft status.

Note: The usage of a Recipe Action in a Recipe is referred to as an Instance, which does not have a status.

To edit a recipe action:

1. Go to Recipes > Action Template and run a search. From the results, select a Recipe Action.
2. Select a Recipe Action Template and click Edit. An Edit Action Template page appears.
 - In the General tab, modify fields as required.
 - In the Instructions tab, modify fields as required. You can add new variables, parameters, and edit or delete existing ones.
 - Click New Variable to add a new variable or New Parameter to add a new parameter.
 - In the Details tab, you can redefine characteristics and acknowledgments.
3. Click OK.

While editing a recipe action instance within a recipe, you can add new Material, Equipment or Standards directly to the BOM, BOE or BOS, without creating a variable.

To add material to a BOM of a recipe:

1. Go to Recipes> Library and run a search.
2. Select a Recipe record which is in the Draft status and click Edit.
3. In the Edit Recipe page, click the BOP tab.
 - a. In the Instructions sub-tab, select a Recipe Action and click Edit.

- b. In the Edit Action page go to Instructions tab click the New Material icon to add material.
 - c. From the palette, choose the Material Type - Input or Output, click OK.
 - d. In the Search Material page, choose criteria and click Search.
 - e. From the search results, select a Material and click OK. A variable place button mentioning the Material appears in the Instructions (Text editor) area.
 - f. Click OK button in edit Recipe Action page.
 - g. Click the BOM tab. Material added in edit Recipe Action instance page appears under this tab.
 - h. Click Save BOM to save the BOM.
4. Click OK.

A message confirms you have updated the recipe successfully. Similarly, you can add NewEquipment and NewStandard within a Recipe Action.

Changing Lifecycle Phases of Recipe Action Template

A Recipe Action template goes through the following phases in its lifecycle:

- **Draft** - the lifecycle phase of a newly created recipe action template. You can roll back a template to the Draft state only from Submitted and Approved status.
- **Submitted** - when the recipe action template is submitted for approval.
- **Approved** - when the recipe action template is approved.
- **Rejected** - not accepted for use.
- **Obsolete** - not valid for execution, however, can be used for reference purposes. Obsolete status actions cannot be revived for approval.

To change the lifecycle phase of a recipe action template:

1. Go to Recipes > Action Template and run a search. Select a recipe action template from the search results.
2. Click Change > Lifecycle Phase and select an applicable lifecycle phase.

The lifecycle phase of the RAT appears on the page along with the chosen category.

Creating Recipe Element Template

The sequential flow of recipe actions is created in recipe element template and can include other recipe elements as well. You can further modify the components in the recipe and optionally save the recipe element as a template.

To create a recipe element template:

1. Go to the Create New Menu, select Recipes > Element Template.
2. In the General tab, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- a. **Recipe Element Level** - The level identifying the position of a Recipe object in the Recipe hierarchy, as prescribed by ISA-88. Recipe Element levels: Unit Procedure, Operation, and Phase. (A phase contains only actions. An operation is a combination of phase and actions and Unit Procedure comprises of operation, phase and actions).

- b. **Life Cycle Point** - The stage of target molecule development.
 - c. Usage:
 - Small Molecule = Chemical Product
 - Large Molecule = Biologics
 - Formulation = Drug Product
 - d. Mode - Method of recording activities.
3. Click Next.
4. In the Instructions sub-tab under BOP tab,
 - a. Select the recipe element record and click Edit SFC.
 - b. In the right pane of the SFC Editor, click on Start is Complete and click Delete or hit the Delete key on your keyboard.
 - c. Click New > Recipe Action From Template and select a recipe action template.
 - d. You can add more than one recipe action template to a recipe element.
 - e. Click anywhere in the right pane to insert the recipe action template. The recipe action template(s) appear under the recipe element in the left pane.
 - f. Click Add > Connection to create the sequence of flow and click OK.
 - g. To edit a recipe action template, select the recipe action and click Edit.
 - h. To save the recipe element together with the recipe actions, select the desired records and click Save As Template.
 - i. Clicking the Next button displays the BOP: Parameters tab. this tab lists the parameters created for recipe actions. User can edit/ delete these parameters.
 - j. Click Next. The Target tab is displayed.
5. In the Targets tab,
 - Click Add Target Material to select the material from material library.
6. Click Finish.

Editing a Recipe Element Template

You can edit a Recipe Element Template only when it is in the Draft status.

To edit a recipe element:

1. Go to Recipes > Element Template and run a search. From the results, select a Recipe Element Template.
2. Select a Recipe Element Template and click Edit. An Edit Element Template page appears.
3. In the General tab, the Level of the Recipe Element is displayed. Modify fields as required.

Note: Unit Procedure can contain Operation, Phase and Action; while a Phase, which is the lowest element can contain actions.

4. In the BOP tab, click the Instructions sub-tab.

5. Select a recipe element and click Edit SFC. For more details on working with SFC, see ["Working with SFC Editor"](#) on page A-1.
6. Click the Parameters tab. It displays a list of associated parameters.
7. To edit a parameter, select a parameter row and click **Edit**. For more details, see Parameters.
8. To delete a parameter, select a parameter row and click Delete.
9. Click OK.
10. Click the Target Material tab.
11. Click the Add Target Material sub-tab. Enter a criteria and run a search for Material.
12. From the search results, select a Material and click **OK**. The Material appears in the table.
13. Click OK.

A message informs you that you have successfully updated the recipe element template.

Changing Lifecycle Phase of Recipe Element Template

A Recipe Action template goes through the following phases in its lifecycle:

- **Draft:** the lifecycle phase of a newly created recipe element template. You can roll back a template to the Draft state from any other lifecycle phase.
- **Submitted:** when the recipe element template is sent for approval.
- **Approved:** when the recipe element template is approved.
- **Rejected:** not accepted for use.
- **Obsolete:** not valid for execution, however, can be used for reference purposes. You can also revive it for approval.

Note: You can edit a recipe element template only when it is in the Draft status.

To change the lifecycle phase of a recipe element template:

1. Go to Recipes > Element Template and run a search. Select a recipe element template from the search results.
2. Click Change > Lifecycle Phase and select an applicable lifecycle phase.

Creating a Recipe

Recipes instruct you about the processes involved in the manufacture of a product. Creating a recipe involves specifying the purpose, acquiring specific raw material and equipment, the quantities of each raw material, and standards you need to follow.

To create a new recipe:

1. Go to Create New menu, select Recipes > Library.
2. In the Preface tab, select the following mandatory fields:
 - **Purpose** - The usage of the recipe - Processing, Cleaning, or Other.

- **Type** - General, Site, or Master Recipe.

Note: Cleaning or "Other" types of recipes do not target a Target Material.

Note: A Processing type recipe requires an approved raw material in the BOM tab and an approved target material in the Output tab for approval.

3. Click Next.
4. In the General sub-tab enter the required information for mandatory fields.

Significant inputs:

- **Operating Mode** - Early or late product development stage.
 - **Regulatory Design** - Indicating if it is starting, penultimate or final material.
5. Click Next.
 - If you selected Site or Master as the Type of recipe in the Preface tab, the Sites tab appears. Use the Lookup icon and select the Site of Execution of this recipe.
 - If you selected General as the Type of recipe in the Preface tab, the Company tab appears. Use the Lookup icon and select the Company where this recipe will be executed.
 6. Click Next.

Bill of Processes (BOP)

In the Instructions sub-tab of the BOP tab, select the recipe record and click Edit SFC to create a sequential flow chart of process.

In the right pane of SFC Editor, click on Start Is Complete and click Delete.

- a. Click New > Element from Template. You can also right-click in the right pane of the editor and select the same option from the menu.
- b. Select a Recipe Element Template and click OK.
- c. Click anywhere in the right pane to add the recipe element object.

For complete details on how to use SFC Editor, see ["Working with SFC Editor"](#) on page A-1.

When you add a recipe element template, the recipe action templates associated with it are added automatically. To add more recipe action templates, click New > Recipe Action Template and select the desired templates. You can add recipe actions with recipe elements at the same level, as well as have recipe actions within elements.

Recipe Actions and Recipe Elements can be created and filled in while creating a recipe via the BOP and saved as a template.

- d. 4. Click OK.

In the Instructions sub-tab, a table lists recipes and associated recipe elements and recipe actions. The sequence and instructions that you entered in the recipe action template appear in the right column.

7. Click Next.

In the Parameters sub-tab, a table lists parameters that you defined in recipe action template and its results.

- a. To edit a parameter, select a record and click Edit.
- b. To edit a variable, you first need to edit a recipe action, select the desired record and click Edit.

8. Click Next.

Bill of Material (BOM)

In the Materials sub-tab, the list of material variables appears. You can resolve the unresolved variables, view sample information of the material to which a variable is resolved. You can add, delete and edit the variables.

Note: You can perform a secondary resolution selecting either one of the following options - All Lots and Containers in the Inventory / Allocated Lots and Containers / Suitable Lots and Containers of a Recipe in the Draft status with a Material variable primarily resolved.

Note: The Instructions column of the BOP tab displays the Container/Lot information embedded with the instruction.

For each material, enter the Planned Quantity to Consume and the Display Order, in which the items will appear in the recipe list.

- To view the information of a material sample, select the desired material variable and click View Sample Information. The Sample Information page displays the Lot ID, Source Container ID and other details from which the selected material was sampled.

To add new material:

1. Click More > Add Material. The Search Material page appears.
2. Select the Recipe Action associated with it.
3. Enter a value in any field and run a search. Select a material from the search results and click OK.
4. Click Next.

The Consumables sub-tab lists consumable material variables. You can resolve the unresolved variables, and also add, delete and edit the variables.

- a. For each material of type Consumable, enter the Planned Quantity to Consume.
- b. Click Next.

Once you resolve material variables, they appear in the spec plan sub-tab.

- c. Select a material row and add new specification plans.
 - d. To delete spec plans, select the row and click Delete.
5. Click Next.

Bill of Equipment (BOE)

The Equipment sub-tab lists equipment variables. You can resolve the unresolved variables, view disposition of equipment, and also add, delete or edit equipment variables.

1. To resolve an unresolved equipment variable, select a variable record and click Resolve Variable.
2. To view the disposition of equipment, select an equipment variable record and click View Equipment Disposition. The Equipment Disposition page displays the equipment name, its availability status, etc. It also contains the OK, Reservations and View Last CleaningActivity buttons.
3. Click OK to return to the BOE page.
 - a. To add new Equipment, click More> Add Equipment.
 - b. In Search Equipment Page, select the Recipe Action associated with it.
 - c. Enter a value in any field and run a search. Select Equipment from the search results and click OK.
4. Click Next.

Output

The Output tab, lists output material variables defined in the Instructions tab of recipe action templates. You can edit these variables, add new material variables and resolve the unresolved variables.

1. To resolve an unresolved output variable, select a variable record and click Resolve Variable.
2. To add material, click More > Add Material.
 - a. In the Search Material page, select the Recipe Action associated with it.
 - b. Enter a value in any field and run a search. Select a material from the search results and click OK.
 - c. Enter Output Quantity. Select the appropriate UOM from the drop-down list.
 - d. Select the Type of the output.
3. Click Next.

Bill of Standards (BOS)

The BOS tab lists standards defined in the instructions entered in recipe action templates. You can edit these standards, add new standard variables and resolve the unresolved variables.

1. To resolve an unresolved standard variable, select a variable record and click Resolve Variable.
2. Click Next.

The Cautions tab displays the caution type standards associated to resolved materials and equipment.

3. Click Finish.

A message confirms the creation of a recipe. The Recipe is ready for publishing.

Note: After you publish a Recipe in RMW, the Recipe BOM table displays both rows of material and consumables. In Product Collaboration, you can view the UOM details of consumable material. Quantity value displays the Unit of Measurement (UOM) and the quantity column value displays the unit.

Editing a Recipe

While editing a recipe, you cannot save the recipe (root node) as a template; you need to select the children (element/ action) to save as the template.

To edit a recipe:

1. Go to Recipes > Library and run a search. From the search results, select a Recipe.
2. Select a Recipe and click Edit > As New Version. You can edit a Recipe in the Draft status as Current Version.
3. Click Save and Edit.
4. Make the necessary modifications in the Edit Recipe page.
5. General
Modify required fields and click OK.
6. **BOP**
 - a. In the Instructions tab, select a recipe element or recipe action and click Edit.
 - b. Modify necessary fields and click Save BOP to save the BOP.
 - c. To save the recipe BOP as a template for future use, click Save As Template. In the Save As Template window, enter a unique Name for the recipe template and click OK.
 - d. In the Parameters tab, you can edit/delete parameters.
 - e. Modify necessary fields and click OK.

Note: You can delete recipe actions /elements only from the SFC editor.

7. **BOM**
 - a. In the Material tab, click the More drop-down button.
 - b. Select Add Material, to add a new material to the BOM.
 - c. Select a Recipe Action to associate with the Material.
 - d. In the Search Material page, choose criteria and click Search.
 - e. From the search results, select a Material and click OK. The Material appears in the BOM table.
 - f. In the Specification Plans tab, add or delete variables.
 - g. In the Consumables tab, edit and resolve the variables.
 - h. Click Save BOM to save the BOM.
8. **BOE**

- a. In the Equipment tab, click the More drop-down button.
- b. Select Add Equipment to add new Equipment to the BOE.
- c. Select a Recipe Action to associate with the Equipment.
- d. In the Search Equipment page, choose criteria and click Search.
- e. From the search results, select Equipment and click OK. The Equipment appears in the BOE table.
- f. Click Save BOE to save the BOE.

Only if the Recipe is of the Cleaning type, the Contaminant sub-tab lists parameters associated with equipment variables.

9. BOS

- a. In the Standards tab, click Add Variable to add a new Standard to the BOS.
- b. To resolve an unresolved standard variable, select a variable record and click Resolve Variable.

Note: While editing a Recipe Action instance within a Recipe, you can add Material, Equipment, and Standards directly to the BOM, BOE and BOS and save the BOM, BOE and BOS.

Creating a Work Request from a Recipe

You can create Work Requests only from Approved Recipes. Once a control recipe moves to the Approved status, the application assigns a system-generated Work Request ID in the In Progress status for the control recipe.

To create a work request:

1. Go to Recipes > Library and run a search. Select an Approved Recipe from the search results.
2. Select Create Work Request from the More drop down list.
3. In the Create Work Request from Recipe page, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- **Project** - Use the Lookup icon and select a project you wish to associate with the work request.
- **Scale Factor** - Denotes the factor by which the quantities in recipe will be scaled for production purposes. This is required for raising and lowering only BOM and Output tab material quantities. For example, for a recipe action, if the quantity of the material, Sodium Hydroxide, is given as 10 gms, the scale factor of 5 will make the quantity to 50 gms.
- **Criticality** - Indicates the criticality of creating the Work Request.
- **Target Yield** - Net amount of actual produce expected.

If the recipe is for Cleaning purpose, the Target Yield field does not appear:

4. Click OK.

Note: For more details on 'Creating a Control Recipe from a Process Step' and 'Creating a Work Request from a Control Recipe', see the Recipe & Material Workspace Process Management Guide.

Batch ML

Planned Work Request details, Recipes, Control Recipes, and Process Steps stored in RMW include:

- Routings of recipe actions
- Material and Equipment required
- Standards you need to follow
- Assays and parameters you need to measure within the recipe action.

These details can now be executed in other systems by exporting them as XML files. BatchML is an XML using tags specified in S-88. The Import from BatchML feature enables you to integrate Master Recipes authored in RMW with external systems.

Listed below are some of the ways you can use Master Recipes.

1. Details in Work Requests, Recipes, Control Recipes and Process Steps can be executed in other systems by exporting them as XML files. The results of the execution will be imported back from external sources into RMW directly as a work request. Based on the context of the work request, the import program attaches it to the appropriate campaign/process step.
2. Converting the contents of a recipe into XML files and sending them to Manufacturing Execution Systems (MES) increases commercial production of material on a large scale.
3. Working jointly with partners, CMO's, CRO's these files can be outsourced as a collaboration item to companies to manufacture material.

Note: The Import/Export BatchML feature is available through Web Services and application User Interface.

Comparing Work Requests

A feature comparing work requests and recipes is supported in Agile. Comparing work requests is achieved by the co-relation view. This compares all the output sample results, BOM quantities used, BOM sample parameter results, BOE and Recipe Action texts.

Comparison of recipes can only be general and not in detail.

Working with Recipe Variables and Parameters

This chapter covers Recipe Variables and Parameters.

Variables

Variables in recipes are links to various objects in the application such as material, equipment and standards. Since these objects can vary with geographical location, availability, restrictions or standards, a variable helps in picking up a qualified object for successful execution of a recipe. The qualified object value depends on the restrictions that you have formulated. Thus, variables provide recipes the flexibility of adapting to multiple environments and conditions.

Variables are of two types:

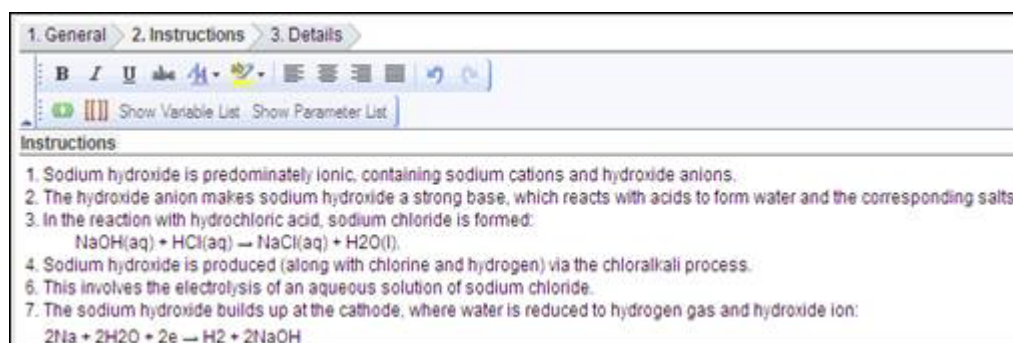
- **Input Variables** - Input variables are the resources required to make a material or perform tasks during the development of a material.
- **Output Variables** - Provides flexibility in case there are by-products being made which are still unknown.

Note: Variables and parameters are defined in Instructions which appear in the Recipe Action Template. For more details, see Creating Recipe Action Template.

Formulation of a Variable

In the Instructions tab, you specify the material, equipment and standards that you will use as input for producing the product and also specify the material that will be the result of the recipe.

For example, you may write the following instruction:



This instruction contains the following objects whose variables need to be created:

1. Material

Input - Sodium Chloride, water, hydrogen

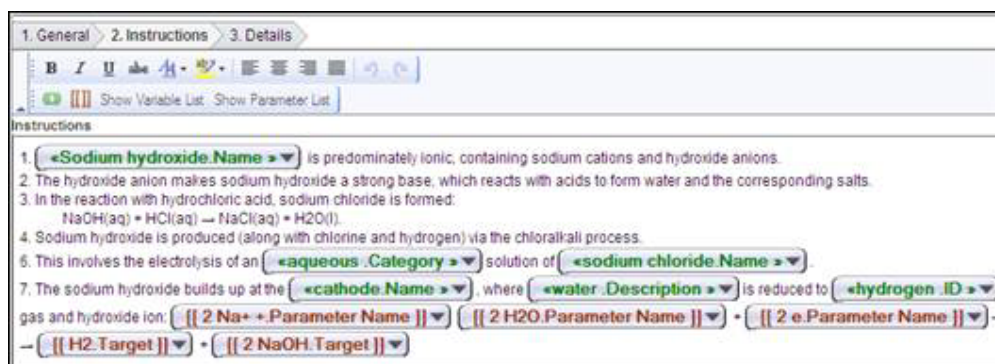
Output - Sodium Hydroxide

2. Equipment - cathode

3. Standards - none

After you create the variables for the object, the object names are replaced by variable objects and appear as shown below:

On clicking Next button, BOP: Parameters tab will be displayed, this tab list the parameters created for recipe actions, User can edit/ delete these parameters.



The variable you create consists of two parts:

- **Variable Name** - A unique name defined for variable. For example, var_H2O.
- **Label** - A Label represents the attribute of the object to which a variable is resolved. These are:

ID - Object ID, for example, 'Material_Water_001'.

Name - Object name, for example, 'Pure Water'.

Description - Complete description of the object, for example, 'Condensed vapors from solar desalination plant'.

Category - Object category, for example, 'Chemical'.

Example:



In the above image, hydrochloric acid is the variable name and Current Resolution is the default label.

Creating a Variable

You create variables during the creation of Instructions in Recipe Action Template or when you edit a recipe or a recipe action template.

To create a new input variable:

1. Click the New Variable icon. Alternatively, you can also create a new variable from the Show Parameter List.
2. In the New Variable window, enter a unique Variable Name.

3. Depending upon your requirement, select one of the variable categories - Equipment, Material or Standards.
4. Click OK.

Using the above steps, you cannot set the variable resolution criteria and can only create input variables for different types of objects - equipment, material and standards. To set the variable resolution criteria and create any input or output variable for Material, use More Variable Info feature in the New Variable window. For more details, see the Agile Recipe Management for Pharmaceuticals Administrator Guide.

To create a new input or output variable:

1. Click the New Variable icon.
2. In the New Variable window, click More Variable Info.
3. Select one of the variable categories from Equipment, Material or Standards.
4. Click Next.
5. In the General tab, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- **VariableName** - A unique name for the variable.
 - **Critical Processing Variable** - If the variable is critical in arriving at the end results in recipe execution.
 - **VariableResolution Criteria** - Variables can only be resolved manually.
 - The following additional fields appear only when you create a material variable:
 - **VariableType** - Input or output.
 - **Is Consumable** - If the material is used as raw material for producing the end product or is a consumable.
6. Click Next.
 7. In the Criteria tab, click New to select the variable resolution criteria.
The Define Criteria page appears.
In the General tab, the application generates a name for the criteria.
 8. Click Next.
 9. In the Criteria tab, click Show Possible Resolutions to select the material to which the variable will be resolved.
 - a. Select a record and click Load Selection into Criteria.
 - b. If you select multiple records as possible resolution for the variable, a Compare Records window appears. The criteria of the selected records is loaded in the search criteria. You can compare the attributes of the materials and decide on a suitable material.
 - c. Once you compare and decide the material you wish to associate to the material variable, select that material's column and click Copy to Criteria Value. The values appear under the column Criteria Value.
 - d. Modify the values, if required.
 - e. Click OK.

- f. Click Finish. The criteria appear in the Criteria tab.
10. Click Finish to save the variable.

Managing Variables

To insert an existing variable from the variable list, click Insert at Cursor. It appears at the location of the cursor in the instructions area. Click the Variable button to edit or delete the variable, or change its label.

To change the label of a variable:

1. Click the Variable button.
2. From the drop down menu, select Change Label and choose an appropriate label.

See "[Formulation of a Variable](#)" on page 3-1, for label descriptions.

Variable List

The Variable List contains variables that you create. To see all the variables available in RMW click Show Variable List in the Instructions tab. To hide the list, click Hide Variable List, which appears when the variable list is open.

Resolving Variables

A Recipe can be executed only when all its variables are resolved to the actual objects. You can resolve them in the recipe.

- Raw Material variable and Consumable Material variable, of the type Input, can be resolved only from the Materials and Consumables sub-tabs of BOM tab, respectively. Material variables can further be resolved to lots and containers through secondary resolution.
- Material variable of the type Output can be resolved from the Output tab.
- Equipment variable can be resolved only from the BOE tab.
- Standard variable can be resolved from Standards sub-tab of BOS tab.

When you create a variable, it is associated to a Category in the library. At the time of its resolution, the variable will search only the selected equipment category to let you pick the desired equipment. You can associate the variable to the whole library or to a specific category under it.

For example, when you create a variable for Equipment, the variable is associated to a Category in the Equipment library, such as Blender.

To resolve a variable:

1. Go to Recipes > Library and run a search. From the search results select a Recipe.
2. Click either Edit > Current Version or As New Version.
3. Based on the type of variable you wish to resolve, go to the corresponding tab. Select a record of an unresolved variable.

Note: You can also resolve a resolved variable to a new object.

4. Click Resolve Variable.
5. In the Resolve Variable window, click OK.

The Criteria edit page appears.

During variable creation, or variable edit, if you define the variable resolution criteria in the Criteria tab; the application automatically populates those criteria components.

6. Click Search.
7. From the list of Possible Resolutions, select a resource that meets your requirements and click OK.

The object appears in place of unresolved variable.

Merge Variables

You can name variables with the same name across two or more Recipe Actions, and the system auto-merges them to be the same resource.

Parameters

Parameters can be settings used to control or measure conditions during the execution of the recipe and can be used to define Quality, Process, Safety or Efficacy of a recipe.

For example, in a recipe action, a material variable Glucose can be further referenced by its pHvalue.pH is the parameter which is eventually measured, in order to control the work request.

Similarly, when a parameter, such as Oven temperature of 160 deg Celsius is assigned to an equipment it substantiates the equipment condition.

Creating Parameters

Parameters define the attributes for a variable. For example, if you choose an Oven as the variable, the parameter you set is 50 degree Celsius.

To create a new parameter:

1. In the Instructions tab, enter instructions.
2. Select the text that you wish to parameterize.
3. Click the New Parameter icon.
4. In the New Parameter window, choose one of the following:
 - Use Parameter Template - to copy parameter and its attributes from a parameter template defined for material analysis.
 - **Copy Specification Plan Parameter** - to copy the parameters used in the specification plan.
 - **Copy Recipe Parameter** - to copy a parameter from another recipe.
5. Select one of the following:
 - **Parameter Name** - to specify a name of your choice.
 - **Use Original Name** - to retain the original name of parameter. This option is applicable when you copy a recipe parameter.
6. You can also create a new variable from Parameter List.
 - Click Show Parameter List.
 - In the parameters table, click New.

- Enter a unique Parameter Name.
- Click OK.

Using the steps given above, you can create only the parameters but cannot specify its constraints or associate it to a variable. To provide complete details of a parameter, use the More Info feature in the New Parameter window.

To create a new parameter and set its details:

7. In the Instructions tab, enter instructions.
8. Select the text you wish to parameterize.
9. Click the New Parameter icon.
10. In the New Parameter window, click EnterMore Info.
11. In the General tab, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- **Associated Variable from Action** - The variable to which this parameter acts as additional constraint.
 - **Critical Processing Parameter** - Whether this parameter is critical in processing of the recipe.
 - **Forward Processing Parameter** - Whether the value of this parameter will match the criteria to go forward in the processing.
 - **Parameter has Constraints** - If you select Yes, the Constraints sub-tab appears in the **Details** tab.
 - **Assay Reference** - The Reference ID of the assays you wish to associate with the parameter.
12. Click Next.
 13. In the Data Definition sub-tab under Details tab, enter the required information.

Significant inputs:

- **Data Type** - Type of data that will be captured during execution.
 - **Float Precision** - A decimal level precision of data values. Enter the number of digits allowed after the decimal place. This field is active only when you select Float as the Data Type.
 - **UOM Group** - The unit of measurement group that is used for carrying out data conversion. For example, the Currency group allows you to carry out conversions between two defined currencies.
 - **Compound Tested For** - Indicates if the parameter is used for measurements on experiments done for compounds. For example, the parameters could be % contaminant, % of salt, % of water. This parameter would be testing for the presence or absence of certain materials.
 - **Entry Field Size** - The length of the data value that you can record. For example, if the parameter for volume is set to 3, the system will not accept a value more than 999.
14. Click Next.
 15. In the Constraints sub-tab under Details tab, specify the following:

- **Value UOM** - The applicable unit of measurement of the data value. Results recorded in any UOM other than that set in this field will not be accepted by the application.
- **Constraints** - Select the constraints that will be applied to the variable. If the constraint is a constant, specify its value in Constant. Select appropriate Operand to define the constraint limits.

16. Click Next.

17. In the **Results** sub-tab under Details tab, enter the required information. These are sent to an execution system in case the recipe is being executed by an MES system. These values determine what you need to do while processing the recipe.

Significant inputs:

- **Allow Range Results** - option to record only a data value from given range limits.
- **Measurement Frequency** - if you select **At Set Interval**, fill the time value in the **Take Measurements Every** field and select a time unit from the dropdown list.
- **Take Measurements in Time Window (plus or minus%)** - specify the allowed deflection in measurement time, in percent.

18. Click Finish.

Managing Parameters

Once created, use the Parameter button to edit, delete the variable, or change label.

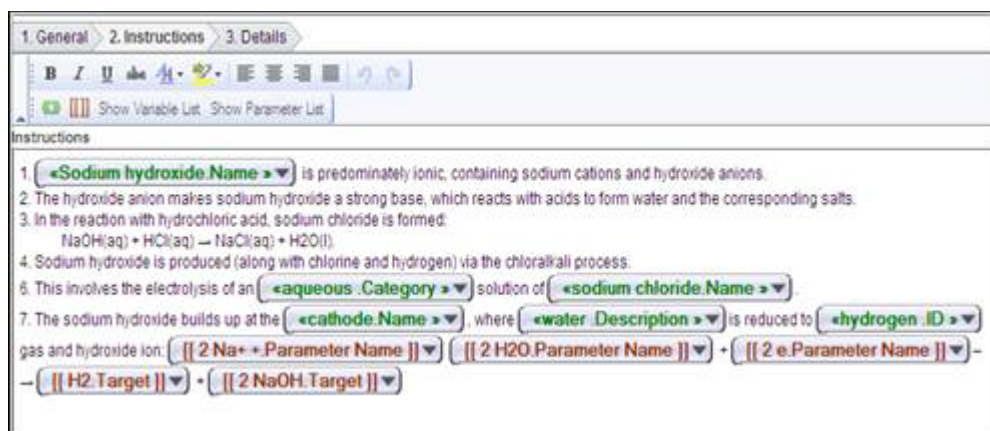
To change the label of a parameter:

1. Click the Parameter button.
2. From the drop-down menu, select Change Label and click the appropriate label.

The Parameter List stores the parameters you create. To see all the parameters available in RMW, click Show Parameter List in the Instructions tab. To hide the list, click Hide Parameter List, which appears when the parameter list is open. To insert an existing parameter from the parameter list into the instructions, select the parameter and click Insert at Cursor. You can edit and delete variables from variable list or save it as a template using the Parameter > Save As Template option.

Working with Text Editor

Instructions for Recipe Actions are written using the inbuilt Text Editor. These appear under the Instructions tab in the Recipe Action Template.



The Text Editor allows you to type in any text and use formatting commands to format the entered text. The editor supports the following functionalities:

- Format the text such as bold face, italicized, or changing the color of the text.
- Inserts variables or parameters as part of the instruction.
- Select/highlight a portion of the text words keyed in and convert it into either a variable or a parameter
- Repeat a set of instructions until a condition is met.
- Support a context-sensitive menu upon selection of a variable or a parameter in the text editor.

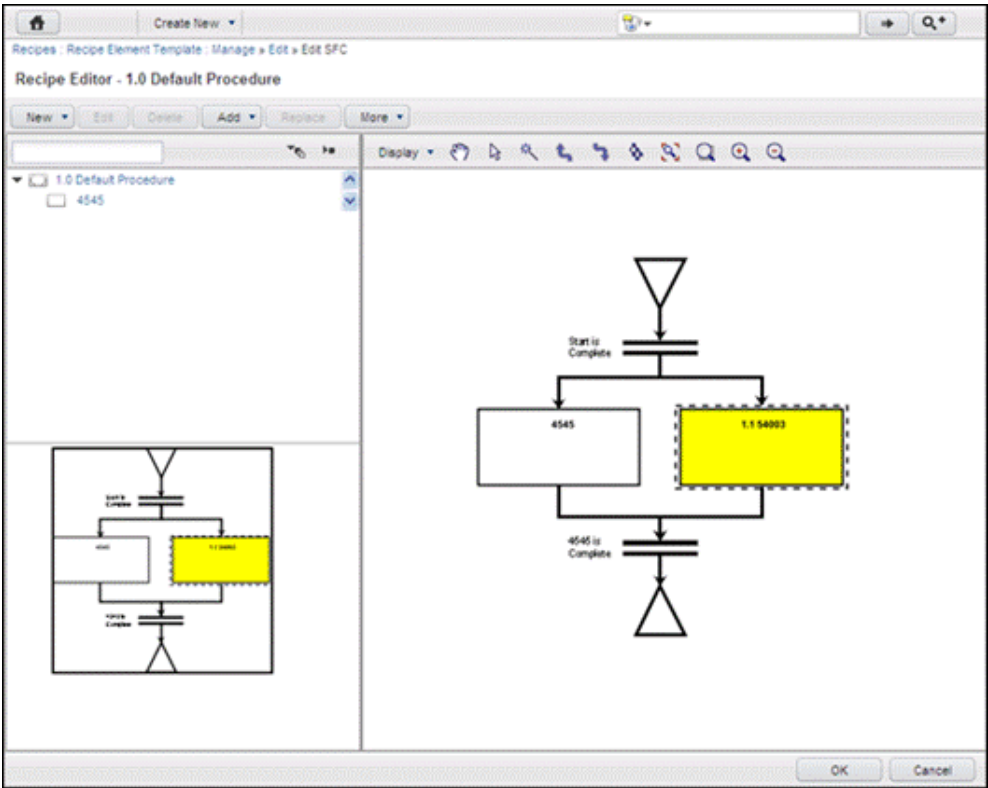
Working with SFC Editor

A Sequential Flow Chart (SFC) Editor is a tool for creating and editing the process flow of Recipes and Recipe Elements. The SFC editor will have nodes that represent an action, a phase or an operation. It provides a graphical way to create a Bill of Processes. You can add and organize multiple actions and elements into a series of steps with a distinct start and stop.

With SFC Editor, you can:

- Add multiple Recipe Actions in a Recipe Element.
- Add multiple Recipe Elements in a Recipe.

- Add multiple Recipe Actions in a Recipe.



Components of SFC

A number of tools are used to create these actions. The table below lists and describes tools that help you in creating a **Sequential Flow Chart**.

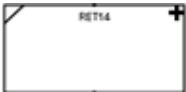
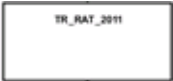

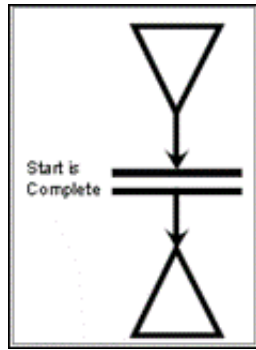
Adding RecipeS Actions

You can add recipe actions in a recipe element or a recipe using the SFC Editor. You can do so either during the creation of recipe element template or a recipe, or while editing them.

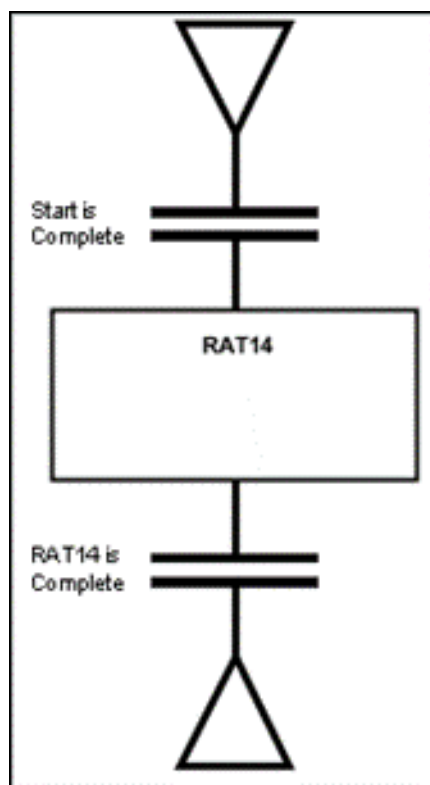
You can add multiple Recipe Action objects and create a sequential flow. The flow includes parallel and conditional branching between recipe actions.

To add a recipe action using the SFC Editor:

- 1. In the Instructions sub-tab under the BOP tab, select a Recipe Element.
- 2. Click Edit SFC. The SFC Editor opens with a basic flow chart in right pane.



3. Click the Nodes Connector and press Delete key, or click Delete on the SFC Editor's menu bar.
The Nodes Connector disappears, leaving the Process Start and Process End nodes.
4. Click New > Recipe Action From Template.
5. From the Recipe Action Templates list, select a recipe action template and click OK.
6. Click anywhere in the right pane to insert the recipe action object.
7. Click the Add Connection action button or on the menu bar, select Add > Connection.
8. Place the cursor on the Process Start node, press the left mouse button and drag the mouse to the desired recipe action object.
9. Release the mouse button.
The Process Start node is connected to the recipe action object.
10. Place the cursor on the recipe action object, press the left mouse button and drag the mouse to the Process End node.
11. Release the mouse button.
The recipe action object is connected to the Process End node and a sequential flow is established.



Adding Recipe Elements

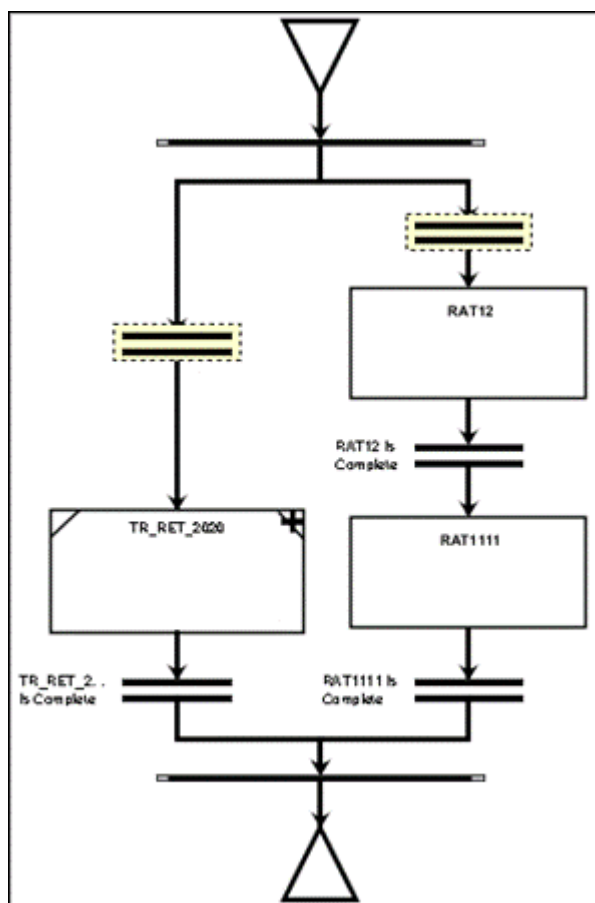
You can add recipe elements to a recipe using the SFC Editor. You can do so, either during the creation of the recipe or while editing it.

The steps to add a recipe element are same as that for adding a recipe action, except that you must select Add > Recipe Element from Template option.

Conditional Branching

You can create conditional branching between various objects - Actions to Actions, Actions to Elements or Elements to Elements, and vice-versa.

Conditional branching helps in meeting the IF-THEN-ELSE requirements in a sequence of events.



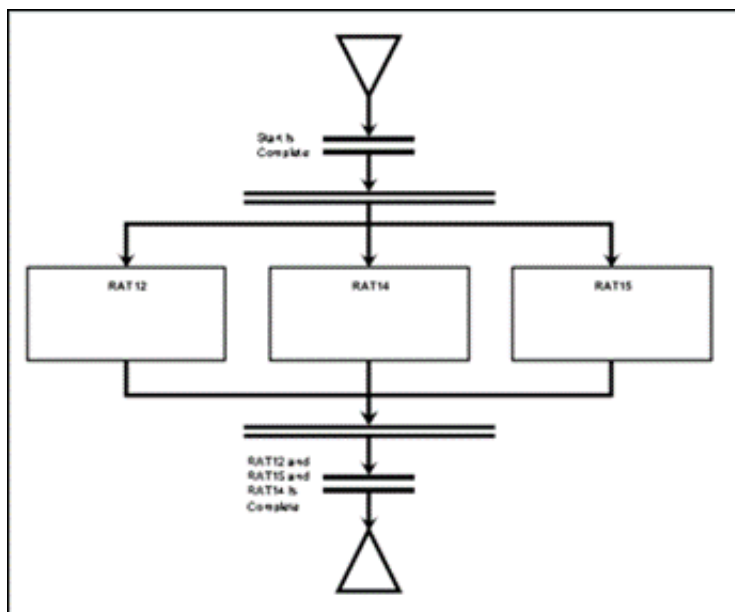
To create a conditional branching:

1. Hold the Ctrl key and click on two or more objects to select them.
2. Click Add > Conditional Branch.

Parallel Branching

When you require parallel processing between Actions, Elements or Actions and Elements, you can use the parallel branching feature of the SFC Editor.

Parallel branching helps in simultaneous processing of events, which meets the **AND** Boolean condition.



To create a parallel branch:

1. Hold the Ctrl key and click on two or more objects to select them.
2. Click Add > Parallel Branch.

Traversing between the Recipe Elements

To ascertain the flow of events between the intermediate Recipe Elements, you can traverse the sequence. You can traverse upwards or downwards from any stage in the sequence.
