- Retail clients who wish to understand the contents of this release.
- Integrators and implementation staff who have the overall responsibility for implementing Oracle Retail Price Management in their enterprise.
- Business analysts who are looking for high-level functional information about this release.
- System analysts and system operation personnel who are looking for high-level functional and technical content related to this release.

Release Notes

Oracle Retail Customer Support investigates submitted issues with the assumption that all release patches have been applied. While it is ultimately at the client's discretion when to apply patches, delays or lags in their application can complicate the support process. When members of Customer Support investigate a potential software bug, they assume that you have applied all patches for a given module before the issue was discovered. To assist in the patch review, Customer Support provides a system-level assessment by assigning a priority. In addition, a cross-reference spreadsheet is provided to assist with this research.

This patch contains the Oracle Retail Price Management (RPM) 10.1.7 patch release. Before you apply the patch, verify that RPM has been installed up to the previous patch, RPM 10.1.6, unless RPM is deployed as a standalone product. RMS 10.1 users should be current with the RMS 10.1.17 patch.

The RPM 10.1.7 patch contains files that were modified since the previous patch release. For detailed information on what is included regarding software fixes in this patch release, see the patch documentation.

Applying Source Code

Before applying the patch source files over your code:

- Note whether customizations have been made to the module. If so, the customizations must be reapplied to the new version of the module (or the fix may need to be applied to the custom version of the code).
- Copy the original files to a different directory before you copy over them, in case you need to refer to them at a later date.

Running Scripts

Please note that scripts do not preserve data. Make sure that all data is backed up prior to running any script.

Deploying the rpm.war File

If you have made no customizations to the initial release and wish to accept all modifications that are included in the RPM 10.1.7 patch, you can save time and effort by extracting the rpm.war file. The rpm.war file contains all of the source code you need to run RPM. You will still need to run scripts manually.

Most application servers extract the .war file automatically. Please see your server documentation for guidance on how to extract the .war file. You may have to modify your server configuration files. After you extract rpm.war, you will have to modify the db.properties file. You must then restart the server for your changes to take effect.

Defect Documentation (DEFECT MODULE XREF RPM 10.1.7.xls)

A defect fix is a modification to the base code (for example, a bug fix, a performance enhancement, or a functional enhancement).

Please review the enclosed defects cross-reference document promptly to establish the impact on your business operations. The defects cross-reference document summarizes corrected defects and is named DEFECT MODULE XREF RPM 10.1.7.xls. It lists every defect number and the accompanying modules/scripts that are included in the patch. Each defect should be fully reviewed before this patch is implemented.

Noteworthy RPM Fixes

RPM 10.1.7 includes general product fixes. See the defect documentation for a complete list of fixes included in the patch. Noteworthy fixes are described in the following table.

Defect Number	Summary
5361030	The user is unable to approve a new worksheet when some of the items in the worksheet are already on clearance in RPM.
5453678	A performance enhancement was made to the merch extract batch program.
5411997	The performance of the RPM application was enhanced by cleaning up the unused objects. Also, there was an upgrade to JDK 1.4.2 to make use of the garbage collector.
5440787	The RPM data extract batch program frontend.java does not write error messages to the log file.
5464841	There is a version mismatch in the DTD of the WEB.XML file for version 10.1.6.
5558107	When the user created a clearance strategy and only defined one or two markdown percents, the system defaulted the rest of the markdown percentages to 0%. In clearance strategy, when a markdown percentage is not entered, the system defaults the markdown to 0.
